On July 30, 2022 there was one juvenile bald eagle confirmed to have the highly pathogenic avian influenza H5N1. There are no human cases of H5N1 in Neah Bay.

We reached out to the Department of Fish and Wildlife regarding Tribal members harvesting a single eagle feather. They stated it is not without risk to gather the single eagle feather. However, if you do, then wash your hands afterwards and leave the feather in the sun for several hours.

Again, there are no persons in Neah Bay diagnosed with the H5N1. Do not touch sick or injured wild birds.
